I/DD MEDICAID UPDATE

LaCosta Parker, IDD Program Manager, first thanked Talley for allowing her to introduce the Behavioral Health team to the Council. LaCosta's brought along two team members and they were Tara Heasley and Racine Allen. LaCosta also thanked the team's predecessors, Deb Goda, Michelle Merritt, and Kenneth Bausell for their help during the transition. LaCosta gave a brief overview of the Behavioral Health IDD/TBI. She talked about the 1915 (c) HCBS Innovations Waiver, the 1915(c) HCBS Traumatic Brain Injury Waiver, the research-based behavioral health treatment for autism spectrum disorder and the 1915(i) SPA (IDD/TBI Service Definitions).

FINANCIAL REPORT

Bryan Dooley gave a brief report on the financial status of the Council. A copy of the report had previously been made available in advance of the Council Meeting.

LEGISLATIVE UPDATE

Franklin, Ph.D. on her own, or through an LLC or similar entity, or through Duke University to engage in the Data Initiative in the amount of \$25,000 in NCCDD funds, with non-federal matching funds waived for an anticipated period of up to six (6) months, starting no sooner than January 16, 2024 and ending no later than September 30, 2024.

[November Council Meeting Motion]Direct the North Carolina Council on Developmental Disabilities (NCCDD) to draft a short-term, six-month, \$25,000 data initiative through either a Request for Application or, if necessary and appropriate, a Sole Source. The Public Policy Committee recommends that NCCDD, after drafting the Data Initiative Proposal, discuss it with leaders at DHHS, particularly at the Division of Health Benefits and the Division of Mental Health, Developmental Disabilities, and Substance Use Services. NCCDD then would bring the proposal to the Executive Committee for final approval. The anticipated end date of the Data Initiative Proposal is September 30, 2024, though those details are requested to be outlined in the Data Initiative Proposal that receives ultimate review through the Executive Committee.

This funding would include up to \$10,000 in additional funding for the In-House Conference Funds Initiative funding to reimburse National APSE for accommodations for people with intellectual, developmental, and other disabilities. This funding would also include up to \$10,000 in additional funding for the NCCDD In-House Jean Wolff Rossi for Participant Involvement Fund for the Council to provide funding for people with intellectual or other developmental disabilities (I/DD) or Family Members to attend the conference. The EC also authorizes NCCDD's Executive Director to increase the Rossi Fund's individual, family, and household in-state event limits from \$600 to up to \$1,200 for the 2024 National APSE Conference.

Jon D'Angelo seconded the motion. The motion was approved by unanimous vote.

c. Proactive Approaches to Justice RFA

MOTION – Donna Spears made a motion to approve the NCCDD to release a Request for Applications (RFA) for a *Proactive Approaches to Justice for People with I/DD* initiative in March, 2024, and in the amount of up to \$110,000.00 with required minimum of 25% non-federal matching funds (e.g., \$36,667.00) each year, for a period of up to three years, with Year 1 (of 3) to begin October 1, 2024 and end September 30, 2025. The RFA response(s) will be due in May 2024 and will

include the updated measurable outcomes included in the Proactive Approaches to Justice for People with I/DD RFA Draft 2 e-mailed to the Executive Committee (EC) in advance of the February 26, 2024 EC meeting. The EC authorizes NCCDD staff to amend the 1) RFA release date, 2) RFA due date, 3) RFA deliverables, and 4) RFA details, as necessary, so long as the RFA retains the intent of its presently included deliverables, and the changes serve to enhance the outcome of and/or interest in the RFA.

November 2023 Council Meeting Motion:

Authorize NCCDD to release a Request for Applications (RFA) for a threeyear Proactive Approaches to Justice for People with I/DD initiative. NCCDD's staff, with final approval from the Executive Committee, will have the authority to determine the following information to add to the draft RFA that the Community Living Committee received on November 3rd:

- The release date and due date;
- The funding amount with a required 25% minimum non-federal match required;
- Add measurable outcomes beyond numbers trained and any language relevant to this;
- Information regarding the RFA process, itself, such as clarification within the RFA as to what constitutes a completed application in order to ensure that applicants will submit complete, rather than incomplete, applications.

Nessie Siler seconded the motion. The motion was approved by unanimous vote.

- d. **Executive Session** -- Confidential Vote/Motion in relation to a Request for Proposal *in silent period*.
- e. CRM SOLUTION COSTS

MOTION – Marjorie Serralles-Russell made a motion to approve the NCCDD to secure through NC DHHS and NC Office of Procurement, Grants, and Contracts authorized methods, a Customer Relationship Management solution or set of solutions that includes NC Legislative Bill and Committee tracking information and other methodologies to provide NCCDD's NC Advocacy Leaders Network an NCCDD owned and retained solution for use in its initiative's engagement, legislative education, other deliverables, and follow-up. The NCCDD is authorized to use up to \$15,000 per year to secure this/these solution(s), provided that NCCDD will retain its data at the end of the contract period(s) and will not need additional funding for archiving.

Donna Spears seconded the motion. The motion was approved by unanimous vote.

• Disability Rights North Carolina (DRNC)

In fact, three of the individuals that appear in videos on the Supported Living Guidebook website are individuals receiving services from FIRSTwnc.
- FIRSTwnc was highly ranked in its initial application to do this work when NCCDD released the Request for Applications (RFA) for this initiative, and, furthermore remained involved and invested in this work throughout the initial contract.
- The Supported Living: A How-to Guidebook initiative involved significant work and efforts across numerous deliverables and this work is more narrow in scope, funding, and effort than would normally be included in an RFA, with immediate action needed to achieve the

complete the prior initiative's desired outcomes in advance of 2025.

 Janet Price-Ferrell, Executive Director of FIRSTwnc, has been participating in the Supported Living Level 2 & 3 Action Team meetings and the quarterly Stakeholders meetings. Janet brings a unique and high level of system knowledge as both a parent of an individual who uses Supported Living and as a provider of Supported Living services.

NCCDD will negotiate the exact amount of funding to complete this initiative with FIRSTwnc. FIRSTwnc will be recommended to utilize the website vendor, Refocus Information Technology, through their quote of approximately \$1,100.00 to complete additional work to the Guidebook that NCCDD staff have identified. FIRSTwnc will also be recommended to collaborate with NCCDD to use the videographer, FIASCO Pictures, to complete one longer how-to video and three short social media clips. The rest of the funds will be used to support FIRSTwnc staff time to update the Guidebook and possibly provide subject matter updates or determine additional website and video needs. FIRSTwnc will have until September 30, 2024, to complete this work.

Introduction:

Charlrean Mapson welcomed the committee and did an icebreaker asking each person to share their birthday month and day.

Charlrean Mapson made a motion to approve the draft November Community Living Committee minutes with one revision to say that the committee approved the August minutes instead of the February minutes. Jonathan D/Angelo seconded the motion. The motion carried with unanimous approval.

Fiscal Update:

Philip Woodward provided the fiscal update since Shar'ron Williams was unable to attend today's committee meeting. He directed the members to look at the Federal Fiscal Year 2023 funds on Page 3 of the budget report document.

Initiative Updates:

Meet The Need NC

Beth Field of the Leadership Alliance for Neurodevelopmental Disabilities (LAND) provided a PowerPoint presentation on the *Meet the Need NC* initiative. Beth invited Lived Experience Networks Speaks (LENS) members to this meeting, and she asked them to raise their hand so the committee could see who was present. Beth said the whole advisory council for the initiative decides its agenda. She said I/DD lived experience drives systems change, and the initiative has a core educational and advocacy component because of the large knowledge gap that exists with the Innovations Waiver. She pointed out that the initiative now participates in NCCDD Policy Education Committee meetings. Beth said the first three years are about building

a foundation, she mentioned starting to focus on the sustainability of the initiative during Year 3, and she shared four goals for Year 3.

Carol Conway mentioned the work that other grassroots groups are doing and asked if NCCDD is asking for a lot from LAND in a short amount of time. She also asked if the initiative will host another Think Tank event. Beth replied that the initiative talked with NCCDD staff and presented their top four or five things to focus on and received guidance from the staff. Talley Wells mentioned how the initiative participates in Policy Education Committee meetings. Cheryl Powell said she will make sure the members receive a list of who sits on the LENS group.

Supported Living: A How-to Guidebook

Philip Woodward provided an update on the *Supported Living: A How-to Guidebook* initiative. He said Jen Waite of Liberty Corner Enterprises did not submit a final draft of the Guidebook nor all of the videos that the videographer owes for this initiative, so he will contact the webmaster and the videographer to discuss next steps. He also pointed out that the draft Guidebook is 62 pages long, so he and other NCCDD staff are looking at ways to provide shorter snippets of information about Supported Living. Carol Conway commented that Supported Living will probably struggle to work well until the North Carolina Department of Health and Human Services (DHHS) makes more housing options available. Brendon Hildreth asked if there is a guardianship handbook similar to this Guidebook, and Philip pointed out the Rethinking Guardianship website as a good model site.

Economic Impact Study

Philip Woodward provided an update on the *Economic Impact Study* initiative report. Philip pointed out that the 35-page report provided a dollar number needed to invest in 20,000 Direct Support Professionals (DSPs) at 18 per hour and what economic impact this number would generate. Carol Conway commented that because she is on the board for The Arc of North Carolina, she has seen a draft, and she believes it needs more graphics. Jonathan D'Angelo said would be interesting if someone could do a reverse economic impact study of what happens if the North Carolina General Assembly does not make these investments. He said he believes it could be a domino effect. Carol mentioned parents losing Social Security income by caring for their children with I/DD instead of working. Philip said he and Talley Wells will continue to work with The Arc of North Carolina on how to share this report.

Community Living Mini-Grants

Philip Woodward provided a brief overview of the seven *Community Living Mini-Grants* initiatives.

After the Law: Guiding the I/DD Community to Supported Decision-Making

Philip Woodward provided a brief overview of this new initiative. Carol Conway asked who at UNC Cares is doing this work, and Philip answered that Ali Climo, Linda Kendall Fields, and Annamae Giles are his primary contacts for this initiative.

Future Investment Discussion:

Proactive Approaches to Justice for People with I/DD RFA

Philip Woodward provided an overview of the revisions to this Request for Applications (RFA) that he, Talley Wells, and David Ingram have worked on. Carol Conway suggested adding school resource officers to the list of people eligible to receive this training. She also expressed an interest in serving on the RFA Application Review Committee, as did Jonathan D'Angelo.



NC Black Disability Network Training to Promote Establishment of IPSE Programs at NC HBCUs Project Year 1 (of 1)

10/15/2023 - 9/30/2024

System Gap Addressed

- Universities and colleges have long recognized the importance of a diverse student body. However, many higher education institutions are missing critical opportunities to expand diversity among students by including students with intellectual disabilities. Creating a more inclusive environment and teaching using universal design can have a multiplier effect that will, in turn, attract more students. Inclusive post-secondary educational (IPSE) opportunities for individuals with intellectual disabilities (ID) (or students with ID and co-occurring developmental disabilities) have been expanding for decades. However, IPSE remains a reality that few families consider. Attending college can contribute to growth among individuals with intellectual disabilities in many of the same ways traditional students benefit from postsecondary education: academic and personal skill building, independence, self-advocacy, friendships, and, perhaps most importantly, employment skills.
- The North Carolina Council on Developmental Disabilities, in partnership with the North Carolina Black Disabilities Network, seeks to grow awareness and education about the need to increase the number of inclusive postsecondary education programs in NC. Currently, NC has three comprehensive transition and post-secondary (CTP) programs, but none exist at a Historically Black College and University (HBCU). This yearlong initiative aims to interrupt the cycle of poor access and opportunity to attend college by offering training and support to interested HBCU stakeholders who want to learn about IPSE programs and offer guidance in how to establish an IPSE on their campus.

Initiative Goals and Timeline

- Conduct Outreach with National and Local Postsecondary Education Alliance Members, North Carolina IPSE Transition Programs, NC Division of Vocational Rehabilitation, Think College, and North Carolina's 11 HBCUs.
- Develop Education and Training Materials and Plan for NC HBCUs inclusive of reasonable and available feedback and recommendations from NCCDD, National and Local Postsecondary Education Alliance Members, North Carolina IPSE Transition Programs, NC Division of Vocational Rehabilitation, Think College, and North Carolina's 11 HBCUs.
- Implement Education and Training to North Carolina's 11 HBCUs on IPSE programs and IPSE program implementation requirements, strategies, and related resources.
- Support NCCDD in updating its HBCU IPSE Request for Applications (RFA) and NCCDD and HBCUs in improving their knowledge and interest in HBCU IPSE programs through creating an IPSE White Paper that includes, but is not limited to, the following information:
 - o Summarizes education and awareness campaign for IPSE at HBCUs
 - Provides policy recommendations for capacity building for IPSEs in NC
 - Identifies Potential Funding Sources for IPSE
 - o Explores the financial feasibility for students to attend an IPSE
- Provides information on cost modeling for HBCU IPSE Program Implementation

Description of Activities

- Meet with National and Local Postsecondary Education Alliance Leaders and Diversity Officials.
- Meet with North Carolina IPSE Transition Programs.
- Establish connections with 11 HBCUs.
- Collaborate with IPSE Leaders on training and education curriculum.
- Make modifications to training and education materials and curriculum to include cultural competencies and tailor materials for HBCUs.
- Schedule a cluster luncheon for regional schools to meet and discuss strategies for starting a program.
- Meet with, educate, and learn from HBCU Stakeholders.
- Create and provide an orientation to Institution of Higher Education Programs.

Outcomes to Date

- Invitations went out to 11 HBCUs to participate in training on their respective campus: 8 of the 11 colleges and universities showed interest, which included: Bennett College, Johnson C. Smith University, Shaw University, Elizabeth City State University, Winston Salem State University, Fayetteville State University, North Carolina A&T, and North Carolina Central University. So far, six universities have signed up for training. The learning experience includes information about what defines an IPSE program and the definition of ID and provides insight into model programs, accreditation standards, and resources. Training participants also learn about the funding criteria for financial support from the NC Council on Developmental Disabilities and other Federal Grantors.
- The initiative engaged with National and Local Postsecondary Education Alliance Leaders and Diversity Officials
- The initiative created training materials (PowerPoint, Self-advocate and Parent Interviews, handout materials) and also updated national IPSE training materials through more of an HBCU perspective.
- Initiative leadership visited Tennessee State University and Lipscomb University to explore their IPSE program operations and their IPSE service coordination.

Ability Leadership Project of NC – Year 1 3/1/2024 – 12/31/2024

System Gap Addresses

- Developmental disabilities policy-based advocacy leadership development training programs involve high cost, outcomes tracking challenges, and barriers to long-term participant follow-up.
- There are no policy-based advocacy leadership development training programs where people with intellectual and other developmental disabilities (I/DD), parents, professionals and other stakeholders train together.
- Individuals with I/DD are rarely training facilitators or coordinators for policy-based advocacy leadership training
 initiatives geared towards individuals with I/DD and their families; and nearly never facilitators and coordinators if
 the leadership training program is geared toward professionals.

Initiative Goals and Timeline

- Graduates of the ALP-NC leadership development training will gain the skills necessary to effectively advocate for self and others.
- Design and produce virtual education and meetings that are accessible and seamless for the end user.
- Tailor the training approach and content to align with ALP-NC's values, methodologies, and mission, specifically
 addressing the needs of people with I/DD and their family members. Integrate practical examples and relevant
 case studies to enhance the training's applicability and effectiveness.
- Update facilitating strategies and techniques to suit the facilitators' skill sets and learning styles, focusing on interactive, participant-engaged methods.
- Incorporate modern technological tools and digital platforms to reflect the latest trends and best practices in digital learning.
- Develop unique participant engagement techniques, ensuring the training resonates with ALP's target audience.
- Refine the learning objectives, language, and terminology to closely align with ALP-NC's goals, target audience, and mission.
- Restructure and reformat the training sessions to better meet the operational needs and preferences of the initiative staff and leaders.
- Develop a method for maintaining long-term contact with training graduates.

Outcomes to Date

- Transitioned contract to Community Bridges Consulting Group (CBCG) from Disability Rights NC who piloted and launched the initiative.
- Individuals with I/DD have lead roles or actively co-lead all aspects of the training, including training coordination, training facilitation, and evaluation.
- Finalized the inclusive leadership development training curriculum and facilitator's guide.
- Finalized the Train the Trainer curriculum and facilitator's guide.
- During DRNC contract graduated 54 trainees with the skills necessary to effectively advocate for self and others (e.g., speak to policy and other decision-makers, give testimony, etc.) at local state and federal
- levels to promote systems change.
- Held 2 Train the Trainer Programs involving 13 participants.
- Prepared 7 trainers of diverse representation including 3 individuals with I/DD.
- Hired a person with IDD as Co-Director/program coordinator for administrative and training responsibilities.
- In March 2024, began promoting for a new training cohort to begin in April 2024.

NC Advocacy Leaders Network – Year 1 10/1/2023 – 9/30/2024

System Gap Addresses

- North Carolina does not have an organized network of developmental disabilities advocacy leaders made up of North Carolinians that are graduates from state and nationally recognized advocacy and leadership development programs, including:
 - Partners in Policymaking©, Advancing Strong Leadership, Leadership Education in Neurodevelopmental Related Disabilities, Steps Toward Independence and Responsibility, Ability Leadership Project of NC, and NC IDD Peer Mentor Training. Other non-disability specific innovative leadership training programs (e.g., The Council on Quality and Leadership professional leadership) will be considered.

Initiative Goals and Timeline

- Establish, maintain, and engage an NC Advocacy Leaders Network made up of North Carolinian graduates of state and nationally recognized advocacy and leadership development programs.
- In collaboration with the NCCDD, establish and maintain the customer relationship management (CRM) data collection system to record and track network member contact and related information, continued education experiences, and advocacy activity.
- Keep informed of the Council's Five-Year State Plan goals and public policy priorities for continued education and engagement opportunities for network members.
- Establish the NC Advocacy Leaders Network as a shared benefit and shared investment for NC orgs, entities, etc. that need well-trained/informed, and savvy advocates including individuals with IDD/self-advocates, parents, family members, and other stakeholders to advance advocacy priorities.

The investment by the NCCDD to Akalaka co. started October 2023 and will end September 2024.

Description of Activities

- Maintain regular contact with network members to:
 - a) continuously build members confidence in reliability of the network;
 - b) keep members informed of disability-related news;
 - c) continuously build upon member skills and knowledge;
 - d) actively work to strengthen member relationships with network coordinators and the NCCDD; and
 - e) connect members with other advocacy organizations and opportunities.
- Coordinate and implement a minimum of 6 virtual gatherings of the network as "getting to know you" experiences and to set the foundation for future events involving continuing education, advocacy, engagement, or information sharing.

Outcomes to Date

The investment by the NCCDD to Akalaka co. started October 2023 and will end September 2024.

- Developed a webpage, 1-page flyer and email that offers a concise overview of the initiative, including website and contact details.
- Provided introduction presentation of the initiative and recruitment message at 2 statewide events.

Peer Mentoring for People with I/DD: Third Cohort 1/1/2024 – 9/30/2024

System Gap Addresses

- Medicaid benefits covering peer support services for individuals with mental illness and/or addiction disorders are well established, and peer mentors have shown positive outcomes.
- Peer support services for individuals with intellectual and developmental disabilities (I/DD) are not well established.
- This initiative aims to demonstrate that peer mentors with an I/DD can positively impact the lives of other individuals with I/DD and their families.

Initiative Goals and Timeline

- Further develop the peer mentor training curriculum to increase peer mentor programs for individuals with I/DD.
- Train 10 15 additional NC Peer Mentors with IDD.
- Promote the IDD Peer Mentor job position for the NC Division of Employment and Independence for People with Disabilities (EIPD).
- Further Promote the Community Health Worker job position as developed by Alliance Health Care Management.
- Develop additional job description(s) for peer mentor with IDD.
- This investment by the NCCDD is for up to six-months: January 1, 2024, through September 30, 2024.

Description of Activities

Coordinated by Community Bridges Consulting Group, this initiative has been a joint venture of Optum, the National Association of Councils on Developmental Disabilities (NACDD), and the North Carolina Council on Developmental Disabilities and now includes the NC Division of Vocational Rehabilitation Services (NCDVRS). The purpose of the Peer Mentoring Training for People with IDD: Third Cohort is to implement the peer mentoring training program for individuals who live independently with the use of Home and Community-Based Services (HCBS). Cohort members will learn key concepts to support peers with I/DD. All classes incorporate learning activities to be done as a group and individually, as well as knowledge checks. Participants will complete a pre-training and post-training evaluation to provide feedback which will be incorporated to improve the overall curriculum. Initiative activities include:

- Recruiting and selecting peer mentor trainees.
- Assessing and assisting with accommodation needs for peer mentors.
- Implementing Peer Mentor Training for 10 15 participants.
- Developing local connections and providing guidance to advance the initiative.
- Developing/finalizing a job description in concert with project partners, including NC Division of EIPD.

Expected Outcomes

- Implement the piloted curriculum to train 10 15 Peer Mentors with intellectual and developmental disabilities, including individuals recommended by NC Division of EIPD.
- Conduct evaluation of Peer Mentor Training for People with individuals with intellectual and developmental disabilities curriculum.
- Build and manage relationships with and among partners and other key stakeholders and serve as a resource for content, ideas, and thought partnership.
- Create infrastructure for network connectivity, acting as a liaison to build deep, sustainable partnerships, prioritizing transformational change.
- Analyze a diversity of data points to inform next steps and long-term goals.
- Identify and respond to conflicts and misalignment, if any, between stakeholders.
- Lead monthly stakeholder calls and other activities that deepen connections and relationships to and among stakeholders.
- Gainful employment for graduates of the Peer Mentor training for people with I/DD.

Self-Advocate Discussion Series

System Gap Addresses

NCCDD has the need to attract, prepare, organize and mobilize NC self-advocates for influencing social and systems change. More NC self-advocates interested in advocating the value of people with disabilities are needed to actively build and maintain relationships with NC legislators and decision-makers. In addition, self-advocates will be supported to develop working relationships and a network among themselves.

Initiative Goals and Timeline

The NCCDD sponsors a monthly NC self-advocate discussion series facilitated by the NCCDD Policy Education Coordinator, NCCDD self-advocate executive committee members, and additional coordinated participation by other NCCDD self-advocate members and staff. One- hour discussion sessions occur monthly. The discussion series is coordinated by NCCDD Advocacy Development Committee staff and by the NCCDD Policy Education Coordinator with support from NCCDD administrative staff, and the Hispanic Advocate initiative staff.

Each session is dedicated to addressing one IDD advocacy topic. Facilitators provide background on the topic and support attendees to share personal stories related to the topic. Sessions aim to be practice forums for using personal stories to build relationships with NC decision-makers and legislators. Experts, trainers, and decision-makers are invited to designated sessions to offer approaches for accessing, conversing, and following up with legislators and policymakers.

Description of Activities

Sessions share and hear stories of lived experience and meet NC Self-Advocate leaders and topic experts. Sessions are dedicated to sharing topic oriented personal stories, NC self-advocate network relationship building, NCCDD awareness, and just being with others who have common interests. Expect sharing and hearing personal stories of lived experience about topics important to IDD advocacy. Join the conversation, spend time with others who have common interests, and become part of the NCCDD community. Sessions balance training, knowledge sharing, and attendee participation to convey the best ways to use our personal stories to discuss topics important to I/DD advocacy.

Achievements and Outcomes to Date

Since Nov. 2021 start:

- 27 # of Self-Advocate Discussion Series sessions held
- 697 # of People Registered in FFY 2022 to attend sessions (includes duplicates and staff)
- 1,059 # of People Registered in FFY 2023 to attend sessions (includes duplicates and staff)
- 661 # of People Registered in FFY 2024 to attend sessions (includes duplicates and staff)
- 322 # of People Registered to date self-identified as person with IDD (includes duplicates)
- 21 # of Topics discussed at series sessions (e.g., Valuable Principle, Voting, How to Talk to Legislators, Employment, Anniversaries: ADA, DD Act, NDEAM, Transportation, DSP Crisis/Waiting List, Emergency Preparedness, and more.)

Supported Living: A How-to Guidebook

Start date: July 2021

System Gap Addressed

- This initiative is made possible through a collaborative relationship between the NCCDD and North Carolina Money Follows the Person Project (NC MFP), a Medicaid project that assists Medicaid-eligible North Carolinians who live in inpatient facilities to move into their own homes and communities with supports.
- This initiative will build upon the existing Supported Living Guidebook/Resource Manual developed by NCCDD's Supported Living: Making the Difference initiative: https:// nccdd.org/supported-living-making-the-difference.html. The purpose of this new initiative is to create a how-to guidebook to help individuals with the highest level of needs successfully access and use the Supported Living Innovations Waiver service that helps individuals with I/DD live in a home of their choice in the community with supports.
- Supported Living provides an opportunity for individuals with complex needs for support to participate in community life.
- While opportunities exist for these individuals to receive funds through a Home and Community Based waiver to supports complex needs, providers and families would benefit from a guidebook to implement and operationalize Supported Living in North Carolina. In the absence of practical guidance on the implementation of supports and approaches to overcoming commonly recognized barriers, individuals with I/DD, families, and providers become reluctant to use the service.
- A how-to guidebook is needed to operationalize the supports, staffing, and community integration of individuals with complex needs as well as to identify approaches to barriers that arise from a variety of factors in the provision of Supported Living for individuals who have the highest levels of need (Levels 2 and 3).
- This initiative supports NCCDD's Goal 2 of the current Five-Year Plan: Increase community living for individuals with I/DD.

Initiative Goals and Timeline

- Develop a "nuts and bolts" guidebook with practical guidance for individuals with I/DD, families, providers, Direct Support Professionals (DSPs), and policymakers.
- Identify systemic barriers that continue to exist related to Supported Living, particularly for individuals with the highest levels of need, and share these barriers and any suggested recommendations for systemic change with the Council and its partners.

Description of Activities

- Create, convene, and facilitate a workgroup or workgroups to provide advice to this initiative and review outlines and drafts of the guidebook.
- Conduct focus groups for individuals with I/DD and their families, providers, DSPs, agency leaders, and
 policymakers to understand the barriers, opportunities, and best practices related to the provision of Supported
 Living Level 2 and 3 services as well as the diverse needs of individuals using these services or who are
 considering using these services.
- Collect, review, and identify best practices, content, and format ideas from relevant resources from other states, experts, and organizations who have experience with Supported Living.
- Identify five or more successful examples of people in North Carolina received Supported Living Level 2 and 3 services to embed as illustrative stories through each of the steps, including barriers they faced and how they were able to overcome the barriers.
- Develop worksheets (print and on-line) and activities that readers can use to both transfer their learning and capture their support needs from each step of the process to their own unique circumstances in taking their own action in moving Supported Living Levels 2 and 3 forward.
- Prepare the draft guidebook in a simple and cognitively accessible format that incorporates principles of plain language and/or the easy read format to make it easy for individuals with I/DD and their family members to read and understand.
- Field test the draft guidebook with stakeholders and experts in Supported Living and incorporate feedback throughout the development of the guidebook.

Achievements and Outcomes to Date

- Contractor, Liberty Corner Enterprises, participated in NCCDD's Supported Living: Making the Difference initiative and participates in quarterly Level 2 & 3 Stakeholders meetings and Level 2 & 3 Action Team meetings.
- Identified guidebook content important to individuals with I/DD, families and providers of Supported Living.
- Hosted monthly workgroup meetings for providers of Supported Living Level 2 and 3 to provide feedback on the guidebook's content.
- Identified two individuals receiving Supported Living services to share their Supported Living story during NCCDD's Draft Olmstead Plan Virtual Forum on October 18, 2021.
- A draft guidebook was unveiled at the Supported Living Level 2 & 3 Stakeholders meeting on September 28, 2023 and is available at www.SLNC4.me.
- Captioned videos of individuals receiving Supported Living Level 2 and 3 are available on the website. A third, long video discussing how Supported Living 2 and 3 is provided is in development for inclusion on the website.
- A hybrid Supported Living NC Innovations Learning and Living Together Conference occurred on April 20, 2023 in Asheville with at least 47 in-person participants.
- The initiative presented Supported Living Lunch and Learn sessions in July and August 2023 with at least 88 and 91 participants at each one, respectively.
- NCCDD staff and stakeholders have identified important Supported Living topics to create plain language and easy-to-read one-pagers to share this information.
- NCCDD has developed a plan for working with a provider organization to revise and finalize the draft Guidebook and improve the readability and usability of information on the Guidebook website.

Expected System Change as Result

- More individuals with I/DD, particularly those individuals with the highest level of support needs, will be able to successfully access and utilize Supported Living services.
- More families of individuals using Supported Living will understand how to do it successfully.
- The Supported Living Innovations Waiver service will expand sustainably in North Carolina as more individuals with I/DD access and use it and as more provider agencies better understand how to provide this service successfully.
- More individuals with I/DD will live in a home of their choice in the community with the supports they need.
- More individuals with I/DD will be fully included, respected, valued, and supported in their communities.

System Gap Addressed	• In 2023, NCCDD awarded seven Community Living Mini-Grants initiatives to organizations that proposed doing activities to advance NCCDD's Community Living goal and support systems change activities or build capacity to enable individuals with intellectual and other developmental disabilities (I/DD) to live full and meaningful lives in the community. These seven initiatives started around January 1, 2024 and will continue until September 30, 2024. The list of initiatives and contractors includes:

	 The purpose of this initiative is to enhance the development and implementation of ZABS Place's Dream Link Skill Development Tracker and Job Placement Portal to help more individuals with I/ DD participate in transition and lifespan planning by offering them the training and resources to gain and improve transferrable employment skills, connect with inclusive employers, and increase the likelihood of them being hired and retained for a job that fits with their career goals.

After the Law: Guiding the I/DD Community to Supported Decision-Making

Start Date: January 2024

System Gap Addressed

- Critical issues related to healthcare decision-making arose during the COVID-19 pandemic for individuals with I/DD.
- Individuals with I/DD have historically been prevented from making many critical life decisions because their rights have been unnecessarily taken from them through guardianship when some type of other supported decision-making or independent decision-making was possible.

Initiative Goals and Timeline

- Build on the work of NCCDD's previous initiatives that focused on rethinking North Carolina's guardianship system and promoting alternatives to full guardianship.
- Educate individuals with I/DD, family members, the legal community, and other key stakeholders about the new Guardianship Rights law titled "<u>An Act to . . . promote the rights and</u> independence of persons subject to the guardianship process."
- Educate community members on how these rights may specifically offer more independence in healthcare decision-making in preparation for or in light of any future pandemic.

Description of Activities

- Identify and assemble subject matter experts and advisory council members, including people with I/DD, family members, and professionals.
- Develop a Decision Tre for people in guardianship proceedings, particularly people with I/DD, family members, and professionals in the I/DD community.
- Complete the Guardianship Alternatives Step-By-Step Guide, incorporation the Decision Tree as well as previously produced materials on the <u>Rethinking Guardianship website</u>.

Achievements and Outcomes to Date

- Identified and assembled an Advisory Committee consisting of 17 people who include people with I/DD, family members and professionals who are all people with lived experience and/or subject matter experts.
- Convened four Advisory Council meetings.
- Consulted with 14 subject matter experts during the first quarter through establishing checkpoints with them to provide written content and feedback on the Step-By-Step guide, including the Decision Tree.
- Reviewed the North Carolina Guardianship Capacity Questionnaire, an Administrative Office of the Courts (AOC) form, and differentiated between decision-making, communication and skill-based items appearing on the form.
- Expanded the original list of 12 options for supported decision-making, only three of which related to health. New options include the use of assistive and adaptive technologies.

Expected System Change as Result

- More people with I/DD will be aware of supported decision-making and other alternatives to full guardianship, especially regarding healthcare decision-making.
- More individuals with I/DD, family members, member of the legal community, and other stakeholders will be aware of the new Guardianship Rights Law in North Carolina.

Competitive Integrated Employment Engagement, White Paper & Conference

System Gap Addressed

Why is NCCDD funding this initiative?

The North Carolina Council on Developmental Disabilities (NCCDD) contracted with i2i Center for Integrated Health to engage the I/DD community and stakeholders in dialogue and visioning for North Carolina's transition to Competitive Integrated Employment (CIE). The North Carolina Department of Health and Human Services (NCDHHS) has made a commitment to increase CIE and has several initiatives moving this forward. There have been significant questions, concerns, and interest in increasing CIE.

What is Competitive Integrated Employment?

Competitive Integrated Employment is a national and local effort to increase inclusive employment for individuals with disabilities in integrated settings at competitive wages. Through federal legislation and policy, the federal government is prompting States to create plans of action that will move the States toward Competitive Integrated Employment principles, policies, and processes. Governor Cooper has issued an Executive Order outlining the Employment First initiative. In addition, North Carolina Department of Health and Human Services has developed a Five-Year Strategic Plan to increase Competitive Integrated Employment. There are many perspectives on how North Carolina should proceed with this transition, the timing and important considerations.

Initiative Goals and Objectives

The i2i Center for Integrative Health interviewed individuals representing all stakeholders in the Competitive Integrated Employment discussion and then engaged in an initial information session with stakeholders, providers, and state leaders, and developed a <u>White Paper</u>. Then, i2i took the "leveling the knowledge" component of the initial discussion and placed alongside it national perspectives and lessons learned from NC and other States to ensure that all participants have the same basic understanding of the intent behind Competitive Integrated Employment. Hosting a pre-conference to its semi-annual conference, i2i embedded in the pre-conference this information and these perspectives, serving to meet the following goals of the initiative:

- 1. Learn about and educate on New Funding and Initiatives for Competitive Integrated Employment in North Carolina.
- 2. Further an understanding and inclusion of all CIE perspectives as the state increases Competitive Integrated Employment opportunities.
- 3. Find common ground on moving CIE forward in NC.
- 4. Hear updated information as well as a national perspective.

Achievements and Outcomes to Date

Key 12-Month Goals Identified at Summit: Topic Areas

Policy and Funding for Competitive Integrated Employment:

- Funding for providers to transform service models.
- Discuss as separate concepts, 14(c) & ADVP
- Providing funds to ADVPs/subminimum wage employers (in addition to SPARK pilot sites) to transition to paying participants at least minimum wage. Funds can be used to support hiring and training job coaches for individuals that need an individual job coach.
- Dismantle workshops *after* implementing something better / somewhere better to go to.

Train Providers of Supported Employment and Tailored Care Managers:

- Consider the creation of a Supported Employment training all providers should utilize across the state for Direct Support Workers so there is consistency amongst job coaches.
- Ensure adequate training of MCO staff (Care Managers) so they can properly educate on CIE/SE.

Educating Employers Around the State and Building Employment Opportunities:

- Create FAQ sheet to be provided to potential employers educating on labor laws / benefits of SE.
- Fund provider transformation to help employers who are competitive transition toward inclusion.
- Utilize peer employers to share their success stories.
- Educate employers about employing people with disabilities (e.g., Windmills Trainings).

Strengthening Components of Supported Employment:

- Job and Benefits Coaching
- Increase Employment Supports
- Build Workforce Competencies
- Interface with Individuals living with I/DD around CIE

Address Social Determinants of Health (SDoH) that Impact Employment:

- Address SDoHs that negatively impact employment for individuals living with I/DD e.g., transportation, communication barriers.
- Promote more transportation options (e.g., Lyft, mileage rates, support rates).
- Recognition/Funding of transportation as a stand-alone, life-long service (as needed).

NC Benefits Counseling Expansion Project Year 3 (of 3) 7/1/2024 - 3/31/2024

System Gap Addressed

- Research on Work Incentives Planning and Assistance (WIPA) projects demonstrates that individuals who receive benefits counseling services are more likely to pursue employment, maintain employment, and leverage available incentives that support their goal of greater financial security and independence.
- The North Carolina Benefits Counseling Services Demonstration Project initiative will attempt to demonstrate the impact of using a tiered model to address the lack of system capacity for providing benefits counseling services to individuals receiving federal and state public assistance.

Initiative Goals and Timeline

- Expand benefits counseling services throughout the state by increasing service capacity through the training of service provider staff as Benefits Liaisons to provide general benefits information and referrals.
- Increase employment participation through provision of initial benefits counseling advisement, benefits information and referral, benefits service plans, and on-going support including access to certified benefits counselors.
- Serve individuals or families through trained partner agencies (service providers, employers, training programs, and family support groups).
- Development of Referral Network (Years 1, 2, and 3).
- Development of Benefits Liaison training curriculum (Years 1, 2, and 3).
- Enhance training of Benefits Liaison's through including specific examples of the impact and benefits of Benefits Counseling examples.
- Tailor family seminars for partner agencies to include relevant benefits topics to parents, family members and other support professionals.

Description of Activities

Year Three included the following activities:

- Delivered additional, enhanced training to agencies.
- Increased and enhanced educational materials sent out to referrals networks.
- Improved in gathering and analyzing outcome data and success stories.
- Delivered family seminars across the state to support financial family decisions.
- Increased the number of individuals pursuing Competitive Integrated Employment activities through trained Benefits Liaisons and family seminars.

Achievements and Outcomes to Date

- Reached out to 303 organizations that serve individuals with I/DD across the state.
- Built 21 new partnerships with family and parent groups. Additionally, formalized 21 partnerships through MOUs with agencies providing services to I/DD individuals.
- Established Benefits Counseling Expansion advisory committee –11 members.
- Trained 141 Benefits Liaisons (partner staff) across the state.
- 145 individuals with I/DD received benefits counseling from a trained Benefits Liaison
- 470 family members have been trained in benefits.
- Provided benefits counseling services to 60 individuals with I/DD and their families.
- Trained 75+ Hispanic/Latino family members with Benefits information in Spanish.
- Distribute benefits information through monthly newsletters, monthly training, and participation in open houses, resource fairs, job fairs, symposiums, and similar events.
