WELCOME AND ATTENDANCE

Alex McArthur, NCCDD Chair, welcomed the members and asked that any Council member with a potential conflict of interest regarding items on the agenda to identify the specific conflict for documentation in the minutes and recuse, as necessary. She also reminded members of the emergency exits at the Hilton Garden Inn. She thanked the members for their participation on Wednesday and Thursday.

The Chair then asked for a moment of silence in remembrance of a former Council member, Renate Macchirole, who recently passed away after battling cancer. Renate was a passionate, outspoken and effective change agent for all. We will miss her tremendously.

Aldea LaParr, NCCDD Secretary, conducted the roll call.

APPROVAL OF COUNCIL MINUTES

Aldea LaParr asked for approval of the May Council meeting minutes. A copy of the minutes had previously been made available to Council members.

MOTION: Anna Cunningham made a motion to approve the May Council meeting minutes. Dan Smith seconded the motion. The motion was approved by unanimous vote.

DIRECTOR'S REPORT

Chris Egan delivered his report to the members. He reflected on the success of including a community engagement component to the meeting beginning with a comprehensive review of the partnership and collaboration with various initiatives and their connection and impact, locally. He also reflected on the leadership of all members of the Council and the importance of leveraging this as mutually beneficial to their personal community and with the NCCDD. Finally, he concluded by reflecting on the long-term commitment and service of Vicki Smith in being a network partner and an active member for over 10 years. Vicki Smith was then presented with a service and recognition award.

FINANCE REPORT

Alex McArthur reminded members to complete their reimbursement forms and submit them to staff. She gave a brief report on the financial status of the Council. A copy of the report had previously been made available and reviewed with Council members.

LEGISLATIVE UPATE/PUBLIC POLICY

Senator Foushee gave a brief legislative update.

PUBLIC COMMENT

Jason Faircloth gave an update on the success of the golf tournament for people with disabilities. Jason stated that there were people with 48 different disabilities and 8 countries were represented at the tournament.

Sheri Badger gave an update on the planning of an emergency management advisory committee. She welcomed help from all who are interested.

Debbie Massey shared a story about her son and described his need for additional supports and services.

Amanda Bergen shared information about the Cub Scouts in her area. She stated that they want to be inclusive and are reaching out because they want the community to know that the Cub Scouts can be accessible and inclusive, if you let them know the need.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

Alex McArthur requested presentation of committee reports. Please refer to the committee minutes for a detailed description of the committee's work, including motions made in committee.

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

The Executive Committee members met May 21, 2018, June 18, 2018 and July 16, 2018. Copies of the minutes were made available to Council members and Alex McArthur asked members to review the minutes and these are also posted on the NCCDD website.

COMMUNITY LIVING COMMITTEE

Committee Chair Kerri Eaker presented the Community Living Committee report. She thanked all committee members and staff and gave a brief update on the discussions from the Thursday meeting and initiative updates. The following motions were presented on the floor for Council consideration:

MOTION: Katherine Boeck made a motion for continuation funding to VAYA Health for the *Supported Living: Making the Difference* initiative. Funding is approved for up to \$100,000 (\$25,000 DD Funds, \$75,000 MFP/NC Medicaid Funds), with a required minimum of 25% non-federal matching funds (\$33,334), for Year 3 (of 3) from January 1, 2019 to December 31, 2019. Cheryl Powell seconded the motion. Christina Dupuch recused herself because she works for VAYA Health. The motion was approved by unanimous vote.

MOTION: Katherine Boeck made a motion for continuation funding to The Arc of North Carolina for the *From Planning to Action: Integrated, Collaborative Care for People with Intellectual and Developmental Disabilities (I/DD)* initiative. Funding is approved for up to \$125,000 with a required minimum of 25% non-federal matching funds (\$41,667), for Year 3 (of 3) from January 1, 2019 to December 31, 2019. Anna Cunningham seconded the motion. The motion was approved by unanimous vote.

FINANCIAL ASSET DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE

Committee Chair Amanda Bergen presented the Financial Asset Development Committee report. She thanked all committee members and staff and gave a brief update on the discussions from the Thursday meeting and initiative updates. The following motion was presented on the floor for Council consideration:

MOTION: Daniel Smith made a motion to charge the Executive Committee to explore integrating the NC ABLE into Upward to Financial Stability curriculum and grant the Executive Committee the authority to approve funding up to \$20,000. Anna Cunningham seconded the motion. The motion was approved by unanimous vote.

ADVOCACY DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE

Committee Chair Nessie Siler presented the Advocacy Development Committee report. She thanked all committee members and staff and gave a brief update on the discussions from the Thursday meeting and initiative updates. The following motions were presented on the floor for Council consideration:

MOTION: Katherine Boeck made a motion that Community Enterprises LLC be approved as the applicant selected for the NCCDD initiative entitled **NC Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) Coordination, Technical Assistance and Fiscal Intermediary Supports** in the amount up to \$125,000 per year with required minimum of 25% non-federal matching funds (minimum of \$41,667) for up to three years, with Year 1 beginning October 1, 2018 to September 30, 2019, with the following contingency:

Marketing Strategy:

 The applicant must address targeted marketing recruitment to underserved/rural areas of North Carolina. Per the RFA, the applicant must address areas of North Carolina that do not have a grassroots group. b. Expand on how the results and outcomes of the initiative will be disseminated/shared. The scope of work should reflect the details regarding how monitoring and evaluation will actually be done, including how the contractor has experience providing one-on-one support to grassroots groups that need support to fill out reports accurately and to report outcomes and any systems change that occurs as a result of their ADA projects.

Mary Edwards seconded the motion. The motion was approved by unanimous vote.

MOTION: Nessie Siler made a motion to (a) endorse grantee Community Enterprises LLC's acceptance of funds from Disability Rights North Carolina to enhance and expand the work conducted pursuant to the ADA Network Coordination, Technical Assistance and Fiscal Intermediary Supports initiative, provided the grantee has the ability and capacity to accept such funds, and (b) direct staff to coordinate with grantee and Disability Rights North Carolina as needed to allow grantee to accept those funds. Eric Chavis seconded the motion. The motion was approved by unanimous vote.

DEVELOPMENTAL DISABILITIES NETWORK PARTNERS UPDATES

Vicki Smith again thanked the Council for her service award and shared her excitement for her upcoming retirement, but also her continued excitement for Disability Rights NC and the new Executive Director, Virginia Knowlton Marcus.

Deb Zuver, Carolina Institute for Developmental Disabilities, gave updates on Heels Up, Project Stir, support of the NC Empowerment Network and SPARKS.

NEW BUSINESS

MOTION: Nessie Siler made a motion to approve the 2019 meeting dates of the Council; February 7 & 8, May 9 & 10, August 8 & 9, and November 6, 7 & 8. Eric Chavis seconded the motion. The motion was approved by unanimous vote.

Chris Egan reminded the members of the various efforts to intentionally solicit for comment and feedback for the NCCDD federally approved Five-Year Plan, as required by the Administration for Community Living (ACL). The public comments received were reviewed by the Executive Committee and shared with the full Council and do not indicate a need to revise the current goals and objectives of the plan.

OLD BUSINESS:

Anna Cunningham gave a brief update on the Communications and Membership Development Ad Hoc Committee. The committee recently met and will make a recommendation to the Executive Committee regarding the chosen recipients for the three advocacy and leadership awards that will be given out at the November Council meeting. The minutes were provided to the members.

Kerri Eaker gave an update on the Five-Year State Plan Ad Hoc Committee. Kerri extended an invitation to anyone who wanted to join the committee.

Dreama McCoy informed the members that Bill Hussey will be retiring September 28th from the Department of Instruction.

Introduction

Committee Chair, Amanda Bergen, welcomed the members and called the meeting to order. She welcomed everyone and introduced newest member of FADC, Mr. Ryan Rotundo. Minutes from the May 2018 committee meeting were then reviewed.

Updates

North Carolina Employment Collaborative RFA:

Amanda transitioned the committee to the NCEC RFA discussion. After review of release dates, and extension Amanda shared that two organizations submitted applications. Amanda shared that staff has drafted list of RFA review committee participants and that invitations to participate will be sent out the following week. NCEC RFA discussions resulted in the committee making the following recommendations that the successful applicant will:

- Place an emphasis on data collection to measure performance
- Place an emphasis on the use of evidence-based practices
- Place an emphasis on informed choice

<u>Update on Inroads to Employment Initiative:</u>

Apprenticeships (Component 1)

Pat Keul provided an update on the Inroads to Employment initiative. NC Business Leadership Network (NCBLN) is working with the NC Apprenticeship Office and the owner/partners of Your Local Greens (YLG) to develop a Registered Apprenticeship with the US Department of Labor at YLG. If successful, this program will be the first of

its kind for the hydroponic industry. Your Local Greens, based in Burlington will be the business partner in the Registered Apprenticeship program. The individual will be instructed on a wide-ranging area of expertise including care for the plant, harvesting, and other aspects of this type of agribusiness. Progress for this activity is on schedule, meetings are still ongoing with NC Apprenticeship to explore job titles in the federal Registered Apprenticeship list that will be most advantageous for the program and NCBLN staff is currently part of that process providing technical assistance. Pat also provided an update regarding the

Business ACTS feeding assistant/pre-apprenticeship presentation was a featured presenter at the State's Leading Age Conference on May 15, 2018 in Asheville. Well-Spring Continuing Care Retirement Center- is in discussion to develop an MOA and hire apprentices through TEACCH and the ARC of Greensboro with technical support from Inroads to Employment staff. NCBLN staff reported that Sharon Towers Continuing Care Retirement Center wants to expand their feeding assistant program and meetings are underway to set a time line for this expansion.

Catawba Valley Technical Community College in Hickory, NC is interested in exploring the development of a Registered Apprenticeship for individuals with I/DD in furniture manufacturing. This may include expanding their existing apprenticeship at the Furniture Academy to include individuals with I/DD or creating a new program for individuals with I/DD. Progress for this activity is on schedule with one meeting held in May in which there was strong interest for supporting Registered Apprenticeships for individuals living with IDD in the furniture sector. NCBLN staff recently toured The Furniture Academy in Hickory, North Carolina where there was a positive reception to supporting a furniture making apprenticeship program for individuals living with I/DD. There are follow up meetings scheduled to explore possible partnerships

Pre-Employment Transition Services (Component 2)

NCBLN has achieved the goal of providing technical assistance for one (of two) school systems in NC to develop a proposal for Pre-Employment Transition Services (Pre-ETS) technical assistance component of this initiative. NCBLN assisted Cleveland County Schools (CCS) proposal which was submitted to NC Vocational Rehabilitation in mid-April

On July 27, 2018 CCS and NCBLN were notified by NCDVR that their Pre-ETS funding was granted.

NCBLN is also meeting with NC Vocational Rehabilitation program management staff on a quarterly basis to select another school system to assist, preferably one that is in Eastern NC or in another location in NC that is underrepresented and has strong collaboration with their local NCDVR Unit Office and the local school system.

Mentorship for a college age student's (Component 3)

Meetings have taken place with UNC-Charlotte's student advisory group for students with disabilities to determine potential mentors for this initiative. Meetings have also taken place at AB Tech Community College in Asheville to discuss developing a mentoring program to align career services with disability services. Plans are underway to approach other community colleges.

Lastly, Pat Keul shared that NCBLN has undergone a rebrand and that starting October 2018 they will be known as Disability: In North Carolina.

Wrap up and Reminders

Amanda reminded committee members that the next Council meeting will be held in Cary, North Carolina November 7^{th} , 8^{th} , and 9^{th} , 2018.

Introduction:

Kerri Eaker opened the meeting welcoming the members and doing an icebreaker activity by asking them to name a song that's on their mind. Kerri recognized Michael Groves and Vicki Smith to thank them for their contributions to the committee and to NCCDD.

MOTION: Joshua Gettinger made the motion to approve the amended February minutes and the May minutes. Katherine Boeck seconded the motion. The motion was approved by unanimous vote.

Yadira provided the fiscal report. The fiscal report was added to the mail-out booklet to help members see the reports before they come to the meetings. She encouraged members to review it and ask questions. Katherine asked her to go over each initiative's current budget.

Initiative Updates:

Rethinking Guardianship: A Person-Centered Approach

Linda Kendall Fields provided an update and said the Division of Aging and Adult Services (DAAS) printed the Rethinking Guardianship: Building a Case for Less Restrictive Alternatives final report this year. She mentioned the initiative's continuing work with the Division of Social Services (DSS) and children who lose some protections when they age out of the foster care system. The new initiative that started on July 1, 2018 with funds from Money Follows the Person (MFP)

and the Transitions to Community Living Initiative (TCLI) will work with people with disabilities who live in facilities to transition to community living. There will be listening sessions to examine the support needs of these individuals.

Linda reported that she had a positive conversation with the Executive Committee of the Conference of Clerks, and they agreed to work on reforming North Carolina's guardianship statute. She said Judge Marion Warren of the Administrative Office of the Courts supports this effort, and she will report to the Rethinking Guardianship Steering Committee when it meets on August 21st.

Joshua Gettinger said he can see the value of this initiative at the end of the 18 months, and he asked about long-term sustainability. Linda mentioned that North Carolina will stay involved as one of the Working Interdisciplinary Network of Guardianship Stakeholders (WINGS) states in the network with American Bar Association oversight.

Katherine Boeck, Brendon Hildreth, and Kerri Eaker discussed specific situations or questions about various types of guardianship situations. Linda responded that clerks are supposed to appoint a trusted individual who knows the person with a disability before appointing a guardian, but this is not equally applied across North Carolina's 100 counties.

Natural Support Network Development

Janet Price-Ferrell gave an update, saying the initiative will host two training meetings called Community Conversations in September in Black Mountain and Goldsboro. She distributed a flyer for these events. This initiative will train at least 25 professionals/family members and at least 25 individuals with I/DD on how natural supports develop. Katherine Boeck asked what "professionals" means. Janet said this term includes case managers and people who work in the I/DD field. Joshua Gettinger asked if we envision a professional being with that same person with I/DD over the course of two years? Janet said Community Navigators can participate, and Kerri Eaker agreed that Community Navigators will benefit from this initiative. Katherine asked about Care Coordinators participating. Mya Lewis said individuals with I/DD will also have other people investing in that person, and a specific professional is not expected to be the lead person all the time. Janet said friends of people with I/DD or other people providing non-paid support to people with I/DD will benefit. Kerri suggested that anybody from a group at church or in the community who wants to provide support can participate, not just Care Coordinators.

Motion Items:

Supported Living: Making the Difference

Jesse Smathers gave an update. The initiative has hosted two webinars in Year Two and stakeholder meetings in April to focus on supporting individuals who

have the highest level (Level 3) of needs. The feedback is pushing next steps that involve changing the living environment and being flexible. Partners are coordinating all of the different efforts together; for example, national speaker David Pitonyak came to Durham in July because of support from Monarch and Cardinal Innovations.

Jesse said the initiative presented at The Arc of North Carolina Conference in March and at the National Association of Councils on Developmental Disabilities (NACDD) Conference in July. More than 27 people have transitioned to Supported Living, and, according to the survey from Trish Farnham, 160 people in North Carolina are using Supported Living services. He also pointed out that North Carolina has 13,000 Innovations Waiver slots. Jesse also provided an update on how the national consultants have been involved. He said there is a goal to close three group homes; one has closed so far.

Kerri Eaker mentioned connecting people to natural supports as people move out of group homes. Jesse responded that social opportunities, sports opportunities, and engaging friends (having connections and not being isolated) all help individuals transition successfully.

MOTION: Joshua Gettinger made a motion for continuation funding to Vaya Health for the *Supported Living: Making the Difference* initiative. Funding is approved for up to \$100,000 (\$25,000 DD Funds, \$75,000 MFP/DMA Funds), with a required minimum of 25% non-federal matching funds (\$33,334), for Year 3 (of 3) from January 1, 2019 to December 31, 2019. Katherine Boeck seconded the motion. The motion was approved by unanimous vote.

From Planning to Action: Integrated Collaborative Care for People with Intellectual and Developmental Disabilities (I/DD)

Jill Hinton and Erika Hagensen gave an update for contractor Karen Luken who is in Florida taking care of a family medical emergency. Jill said many children with I/DD have been identified who were not previously diagnosed with I/DD. Erika expressed surprise at how many doctors work with kids without asking if they are on the waiver or the waiting list and discussed the Modified Checklist for Autism in Toddlers (MCAT). Jill said the pediatric access phone line is open now, and the initiative can track its use.

Mya Lewis talked about the Consultation Summit that occurred in Raleigh on May 21st with updates on the initiative's two pilots and presentations from Michigan and Wyoming experts. Jill feels as if everyone left the Summit with shared knowledge rather than feeling as if one state is better than another state. Erika said studying other consultation models will assist with Medicaid Transformation, and she commended NCCDD's focus in launching something

that will work.

Jill mentioned the Division of Mental Health, Developmental Disabilities and Substance Abuse Services (DMH/DD/SAS) providing funding for this initiative. There will be three pilot expansion sites – one with the Mission Health Family Support Network in Asheville, one in Wilmington, and one in Greenville. Joshua Gettinger said he knows how Duke and UNC collaborate, but he asked, how does this third part get in? Mya explained that the funding from DMH/DD/SAS came to ensure that this consultation work spreads through all areas, not just Raleigh. Erika talked about how to address data points to provide a more full picture, and Jill said the DMH/DD/SAS project shows the ripple effect of this initiative. Vicki Smith mentioned children with complex health needs and how they fit into this work. Erika commended everyone's participation and partnership to help this initiative achieve successful outcomes.

Brendon Hildreth asked a question about advocating and spreading this information around New Bern. Jill said we are trying to achieve systems change all over our state, not only in our pilot areas.

MOTION: Katherine Boeck made a motion for continuation funding to The Arc of North Carolina for the *From Planning to Action: Integrated, Collaborative Care for People with Intellectual and Developmental Disabilities (I/DD)* initiative. Funding is approved for up to \$125,000 with a required minimum of 25% non-federal matching funds (\$41,667), for Year 3 (of 3) from January 1, 2019 to December 31, 2019. Allison Dodson seconded the motion. The motion was approved by unanimous vote.

RFA Discussion:

Transportation (RFA Update)

Andrea Misenheimer asked about the article, "The State of Transportation for People with Intellectual and Developmental Disabilities in Medicaid Home and Community-Based Services 1915(c) Waivers", that Philip Woodward mentioned during the morning meeting. Philip will send the article to the Community Living Committee members. Kerri Eaker wondered if this type of transportation is only for medical purposes, but she said access to the community is important. Joshua Gettinger said transportation will be an expensive issue to resolve, and a demonstration with 50 people must happen in a specific way. He added that we cannot resolve this issue without major changes to the transportation system. Vicki Smith suggested looking at what the specific barriers are, including a city that has resources and a city that does not have enough transportation. Kerri agreed that it is important to address the barrier instead of just looking at how to improve access for people with I/DD.

The committee then discussed the idea of accessible vans that people can share, but liability and having liability insurance are concerns. Kerri said some type of financial stability is necessary to be able to own a vehicle.

Philip said the North Carolina Department of Transportation (NCDOT) recognizes the importance of removing transportation barriers for people with I/DD and other disabilities, including senior citizens. He will analyze the data that NCDOT recently sent to him, do more research, and provide an update at the November meeting.

Wrap Up and Reminders

Kerri Eaker motioned to adjourn. The meeting was adjourned at 12:27 p.m.

Cheryl Powell seconded the motion. Christina Dupuch recused herself because she works for VAYA Health. The motion was approved by unanimous vote.

MOTION: Katherine Boeck made a motion for continuation funding to The Arc of North Carolina for the *From Planning to Action: Integrated, Collaborative Care for People with Intellectual and Developmental Disabilities (I/DD)* initiative. Marketing Strategy:

 The applicant must address targeted marketing recruitment to underserved/rural areas of North Carolina. Per the RFA, the applicant must address areas of North Carolina that do not have a grassroots group. b. Expand on how the results and outcomes of the initiative will be disseminated/shared. The scope of work should reflect the details regarding how monitoring and evaluation will actually be done, including how the contractor has experience providing one-on-one support to grassroots groups that need support to fill out reports accurately and to report outcomes and any systems change that occurs as a result of their ADA projects.

Mary Edwards seconded the motion. The motion was approved by unanimous vote.

OBJECTIVE B: Increase individual, family, public and system knowledge and engagement to provide system advocacy for the financial security and community living opportunities of individuals with I/DD; with additional specific emphasis to increase the knowledge and engagement of members of the NC Hispanic/Latino community

Measurement: More individuals with I/DD and their families will knowledgeably advocate and take part in decisions that affect their lives, the lives of others and/or systems; with additional specific emphasis to produce accessible communication so more Hispanic/Latino individuals with I/DD will lead and sustain self-directed lives through self-advocacy, family advocacy and stakeholder leadership.

OBJECTIVE C: Increase professional development to improve expectations and supports for individuals with I/DD

Measurement: More I/DD professionals, other professionals and community leaders will receive leadership development to support collective impact to advance the financial security and community living opportunities of individuals with I/DD.

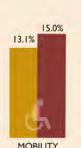

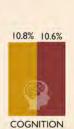
