What is an elevator speech?

- An elevator speech is a clear, brief message about you or your organization. For an organization, it communicates who you are, what your company or organization does and how does it benefit the community at large.
- An elevator speech is typically 30 seconds.



Evaluate

- Purpose:
 - Start a conversation
 - Define the problems you solve
 - Differentiate
 - Get their attention
- Environment:
 - Association peer group
 - Social or community setting (church, rotary, etc.)



How To

- Inventory what you do VERBS.
- Identify your goals– NOUNS
- Evaluate/prioritize them
- How do you do what you distinction, differentiation
- Who do you produce these programs and initiatives for?
- Why do you offer these programs and initiatives?
- What are the next logical steps (options)
- Define call to action
- Create a "creative hook" (not your slogan)



9 C's of an Effective Elevator Speech

- 1. Concise
- 2. Clear
- 3. Compelling
- 4. Credible
- 5. Conceptual
- 6. Concrete
- 7. Customized
- 8. Consistent
- 9. Conversational



Key elements of elevator speech

- Identify goal
 - What should the elevator speech achieve?
- Explain what your organization does
- Communicate "how"?
 - Five Year Plan
 - Asset development
 - Community living
 - Advocacy
 - Funding initiatives that support the Five Year Plan
 - Advocacy
 - Statewide events







Write It Out

(Who: company name) provides/produces (enter series of nouns or verbs) using (points of differentiation or distinction) to assure (higher level benefits).

Often, (target audience) lack the know-how and resources to (problem you solve), we help them do that.

Simply put, our (unique resources or capabilities) bring (insert creative hook!)



EXAMPLE: What is NCCDD?

- NCCDD is a 40-member Council that advocates for full inclusion and integration of people with intellectual and other developmental disabilities across North Carolina. Through Council-funded initiatives, NCCDD supports employment, education, community living and advocacy.

What does NCCDD do and what benefits does it provide for its constituencies?

- NCCDD is a Governor-appointed Council dedicated to advocating for full inclusion and integration of people with intellectual and other developmental disabilities. The Council funds projects, activities and initiatives supporting its Five Year Plan goals of increased financial security, community living and advocacy for people with I/DD.
- NCCDD is dedicated to full inclusion and integration of people with intellectual and other developmental disabilities and funds projects, activities and initiatives supporting the financial security, increased community living and advocacy for people with I/DD.
